

## Career Updates

Portland Place School

### Year 10 Career Talk: Commodity Training

This week for the second in our Career Talk series, we welcomed **Ehsan Parvizian**, parent to a Year 6 student, who shared with us his experiences of working trading international commodities. He explained that commodity training was not to be confused with financial trading (although this does have a bearing on his work) and that oil, gas, iron ore, cement, steel, wheat, soyabean and sugar are some of the popular commodities that are traded between countries.

Ehsan studied Aerospace Engineering at Bath University and working in the city in finance was a popular option to pursue after this. Ehsan wanted a different option and he started working for a big commodities firm. This helped him to learn about the business, the commodities and how these trade deals are arranged between countries. When he felt he had a good understanding of the field and enough experience it was time to take a risk, he decided to branch out on his own. He began arranging his own trades and built a business.

His work in commodities trading is really varied, and involves travel, he liaises with people in different countries and often has to scout out resources in locations. He deals with shipping companies and port authorities also. Numeracy and business acumen are important skills for this type of trading. Ehsan also mentioned how the ability to negotiate is important when he faces issues.

A summer's day at The Kia Oval, August 2018. I am sat with my dad in the Peter May Stand for Surrey vs Lancashire in the County Championship. A tense blanket of quietness descends as the bowler, Morne Morkel, turns and walks back to his mark. The feelings of this match rush around the ground. The fans are so quiet, you could hear a pin drop and it would echo around South London. Lancashire are 264 for 9, and need just seven more runs to claim victory.

Morkel takes his first step and begins his run-up.

The batter is Matt Parkinson. His mind is clouded with thoughts of praise if they scramble home or the negative air in the changing room if they don't. Back in the pavilion, Lancashire players stare through the changing-room window, hands pushing against the glass, their hearts beating as fast as light. Parkinson's muscles tense, his brow is sweaty and raining like a waterfall. His grip slips and slides like oil in his gloves.

Even Morne Morkel, a hostile South African bowler, fears what might happen. It is down to him to get the wicket, him to win the match. It was like the world is on his shoulders, the ball rotating in his hand, the seam pressing against his stretched fingers, engraving marks. The wickets are right in front of him, three wooden stumps that could bring a famous victory.

Morkel is now in full flow, a fearsome blur as he unfurls at the crease.

The Kia Oval surrounds this brilliant match, with the gasometer looming up behind me and rows of Kennington flats straight ahead. To my left is the pavilion, which has looked out over many great Surrey cricketers from Peter May to Rory Burns, Jack Hobbs to Ben Foakes.



Will Jacks is crouched at short leg. His helmet securely on, hands open for catching. His eyes move fast. He watches the batter closely. He has seen the game unfold from his position and now he will see how it ends. His shirt is worn and sticky. His trainers are covered in dirt, dust caking the whiteness. His hair is a tangle and glistens from sweat.

Morkel jumps into his delivery and then thumps back into the surface. The ball is unleashed. Just short of a length, it forces Parkinson back. The ball flashes off the face of the bat, then a hand shoots up snatching it out of the air. It is Will Jacks' hand.

The celebrations are wild. Players run off in different directions, some following the bowler and others following the catcher. The ground erupts. My dad and I leap to our feet in celebration. Some in the Peter May Stand just sit stunned, others dance and cheer, some sing, me and my dad are hugging. We have watched one of the best cricket matches ever. It was won by my team Surrey, and we now believed we had the Championship in our grasp!



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
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## Creative Arts has arrived in GPS!





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## St George's Park Football Trip



On Saturday 21<sup>st</sup> – Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup> May, PPS took 3 football squads on a trip St George's Park, the England national team's football training facility! After a bright and early start the group embarked on the three-hour coach trip up to Staffordshire. Upon arrival the boys changed quickly and made their way to their pitch for their first training session. The boys were put through their paces by two FA Elite coaches in a challenging, high paced and enjoyable session. It was great to see the boys really showing a keen interest in the coach's guidance and feedback on the latest English football philosophy.

On completion of the training session the squad was taken on a tour of the facilities. It was highlighted that every single England football team trains at St George's Park and a number of top level professional clubs also train at the facility throughout the year. The boys were shown a variety of pitches that are modelled to the exact specifications of the Wembley football pitch, the team was also shown other facilities including the changing rooms, video analysis rooms, futsal centre and hydrotherapy rehab centre.



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Once the tour of St Georges Park was complete, the boys made their way back to their pitch for a fun football session. Most of the squad completed Mr Kubik's '2 touch challenge' which involved players controlling a long ball with one touch and using their second touch to try and find the back of the net past Mr Tasic and Mr Rider in goal – not an easy feat considering both are rather large individuals! Pupils also participated in an interschool match with a teacher overseeing each team. Mr Tasic's u12/13 team were victorious over Mr Kubik's and Mr Stewards u14/15 team were victorious over Mr Rider's!



After 4 hours of high energy football the boys (and teachers) were ready for some recovery. The squad made their way to the hydrotherapy suite and were put through an excellent and informative water-based recovery session by the FA coaches! The boys found it tough but rewarding and I think they were surprised when they found out that the session they completed would be completed by England players 3 times a day! After a busy afternoon the boys had dinner and got in some well-earned rest

On Sunday morning all three teams made their way down to the restaurant to take on a nutritious breakfast to provide the required energy for their big games! After breakfast PPS checked out and left St George's Park to make their way to two separate pitches for their fixtures against three local clubs. PPS U12's took on local club Stapenhill Swans in an extremely closely fought contest. PPS had the lion's share of possession and created more chances than Stapenhill but Stapenhill took a 3-2 victory! PPS were the losing side, but the lads showed a lot of character and played some excellent attacking football. **Humphrey Boland** scored both goals and was the deserved player of the match.

The U13/14 team also took on a Stapenhill Swans; the boys had a fast start and took an early lead but unforced errors let Stapenhill back into the game. PPS again took the lead in the second half and were leading 4-2 midway through the half. However, PPS then missed a penalty and it all went wrong from there with Stapenhill scoring 3 quick fire goals to take the lead and the win. The goal scorers in the game were **Sonny Shelton** x2, **Lucas Parker** and **Rafer Moge**. Miles Sellens Flack was awarded player of the match after a superb performance.



PPS U15's took on a strong Ashby United side in a game full of pace and quality. It was a very tight contest which PPS could have won if they had taken their chances but at the final whistle were on the receiving end of a 4-2 loss. **Jessy Fryer Jacobs** scored from the penalty spot and **Kai Ibrahim** finished well with a powerful drive into the roof of the net. Player of the match was awarded to **Lloyd Day** who was a constant menace with his pace and power. It was a shame the boys lost their fixtures, but every game was extremely close and could have gone either way! It was a fantastic weekend, the boys got to play football at one of the best training facilities in the world and it was a pleasure to see them show so much enthusiasm and interest towards their football, The FA elite coaches spoke very highly of them. I hope they enjoyed the trip and had a memorable experience. Well done boys!

## ISA London North Athletics Championships

On Thursday 23<sup>rd</sup> May, a 33-strong boys and girls athletics team headed to Bedford International Athletics Stadium to contest the London North Independent Schools Athletics Championships, which acts as the qualifier for the National Finals held in Birmingham later in the term. Having performed very well at the recent Westminster Borough Championships, many of the squad were confident of success, however a large proportion of the squad had been involved in a long and fatiguing weekend at St George's Park, taking part in two training sessions and a match, and were therefore understandably tired, and perhaps not at their best. That being said, many of the Portland athletes performed extremely well and produced performances that they can be very proud of.



The stand-out effort of the day was from **Sonny Brendon**, who doubled up in the Year 8&9 1500m and 800m, as well as running the relay at the end of the day. Sonny placed 6<sup>th</sup> in the 1500m, and within an hour was back on the track for the 800m. After the first lap he kicked early, distancing himself from the field. A couple of other runners tried to close the gap, but Sonny maintained his lead for the whole last 350m and was a convincing winner in 2:25. Sonny will now have the opportunity to represent London North in the ISA National Finals in Birmingham.

Many other medals were won by Portland, though we are still awaiting confirmed results. Pleasingly, our Y10 boys team managed to place 3<sup>rd</sup> in the overall points contest, with the other 11 schools competing. Medallists included:
