exams therefore will be on punctuation.  
We would like to remind everyone how to  
use punctuation marks with our  
punctuation face:

### Exclamation Mark

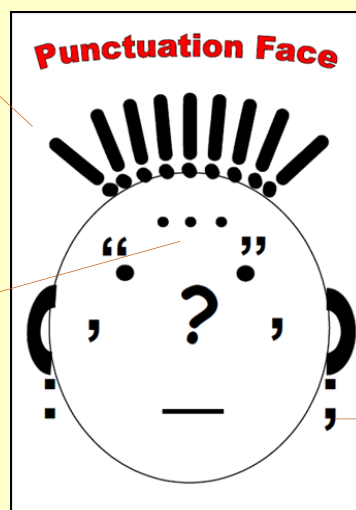
Shows  
interjection/surprise/stro  
ng emotion  
~ What a triumph!  
~ I've just about had  
enough!  
~ Wonderful!

### Ellipsis

~ Indicate that a  
word/words have been  
left out in formal speech  
– when you are writing a  
report and only want to  
include the most  
important bits

~ Can be used to show  
character – perhaps  
nervous so stuttering, or  
trailing off at the end of  
speech: "Please ... stop  
it ... don't ...!"

~ can be used to add  
tension or leave the  
reader on a cliff hanger  
– duh, duh, duuuuh...



### Semi-Colon

~ Connects two  
independent clauses to  
show thoughts on either  
side of it that are  
balanced and  
connected: The ice  
cream truck man drove  
by my house today; he  
was wearing a Santa hat!

~ Can also separate  
words or items within the  
list: My favourite acts  
included Ben, a fantastic  
juggler; Jonathan, a  
daring fireater; and Gina,  
who gave us her best  
Simon Cowell impression.

# Noticeboard

## Apostrophe

~ to **show that letters have been left out** – omission or contraction in words such as *don't* or *can't*.  
~ to **show possession**: Jack's pencil case  
~ **careful when plural and possession**: *the soldiers' guns*.

## Full Stop

~ used at the end of a sentence (except for when a question mark or exclamation mark is used).

## Brackets

~ **Enclose separate or additional information**: *Jake told me he had won the race (though I don't think that is true) and showed me a medal he'd been given.*

## Comma

~ separates items in lists without using *and*: *I saw a chicken, a cow and some geese at the farm.*  
~ separates phrases in a sentence: *Granddad, who was unbelievably tall, always struggled to get through the door to my tree house.*  
~ separates sentence adverbs ('however' or 'furthermore') from the rest of the sentence: *However, Dennis didn't want to play football, so he sat on the bench happily eating his apple.*  
~ separates direct speech from the speaker: *Gemma said, "let's go to the park this weekend!"*

## Speech Marks

~ indicate quotes (for evidence in newspaper article): *"It is said 70% of Britons breathe polluted air" (Daily Focus)*

~ direct speech: *She said, "I can do it", though it is still incomplete.*

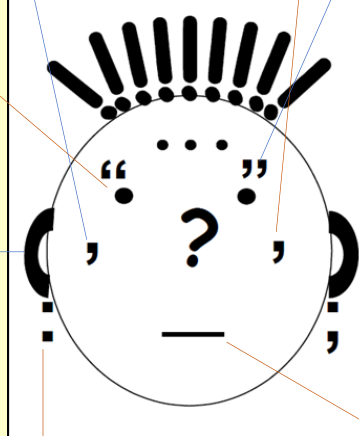
~ indicate slang or foreign phrases: this *"port-fenetre"* is a classical invention

## Hyphen

~ used in some **compound words**: *mother-in-law, ice-skate, long-eared*  
~ **abrupt break in sentence, or a change in thought**  
~ Can sometimes be used **instead of brackets or commas to separate a phrase**: *John – who is rather strange – asked me if I'd like to play his tuba.*

~ shows **an interruption or hesitancy in speech**: *"I – um – well I want to come with you to the island!" whispered Jenny hesitantly*

## Colons

~ Introduces a **list/dialogue/definition**.  
~ In all cases **needs to follow a full sentence**: *We had a lot to pack before our holiday: sun cream, sunglasses and my bucket and spade.*

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# Sports report

Portland's Year 8's enjoyed a convincing win over North Bridge at Regent's Park on Monday afternoon despite a couple of key players missing from the squad due to injury. PPS opened the scoring from the first attack following the kick-off, with **Adulelah** finishing off a bulldozing run from **Eddie**. NBH elected to receive the re-start but were quickly dispossessed and this time it was captain, **Humphrey** who touched down over the line. Portland added two more in quick succession through **Taishi** and **Spike**. The latter effort was a superbly worked team try, with some nice passing, a few quick rucks, a couple of off-loads and some great running lines.

North Bridge had a couple of strong runners and went over twice before the break before Humphrey reasserted his team with his second try, taking Portland into half time 25-10 ahead. Portland's tackling throughout the game was a big improvement on previous matches and with no player was this more evident than **Flynn**, at full-back, who made two outstanding try-saving tackles in the first half.

***PPS 15 v 30 North Bridge***

On Tuesday 7<sup>th</sup> March PPS took on North Bridge Hampstead School in a highly competitive game of rugby. The conditions at Regents' Park were challenging for both teams with a band of sleet and snow setting in just before kick-off and the early stages of the game were very scrappy with lots of mistakes. PPS took an early lead through **Enzo** who scored an excellent individual try. PPS were carrying the ball hard and were particularly impressive at the breakdown with each player supporting the ball carrier closely and getting into a strong ruck position as soon as their teammate went to ground. North Bridge had some dangerous ball carriers with good pace, power and strength but PPS showed no fear in defence and whilst their tackling technique wasn't at its best you couldn't fault their effort and bravery. At half time PPS were leading after further tries from **Jacob** and **Enzo**.

At the start of the second half North Bridge equalised early and PPS started to lose a bit of confidence. Unfortunately, PPS went through a patch of play where they just could not keep possession of the ball and they had to do lots of defending. **Enzo, Roman, Jacob** and **Joe** all made some excellent tackles and there were some great efforts from **Tom** and **Mohammed**. Whilst the defending was good, the attacking play was not going well – PPS gave the ball away frequently and were punished for their errors.
